It has become a beautiful rhythm in our church life that we set aside time during Holy Week to pray continuously. Some of us choose an hour, others more. Some of us pray during the night, others during the day. Some of us speak, some of us write, some of us paint, some of us remain silent. Each of us is unique in our approach to prayer, yet what unites us is our shared desire to experience deeper intimacy with Father God, Jesus and Holy Spirit through this time of prayer.

We pray Paul's prayer to the early church over you and ask that you would pray it over the person who has come before and will go after you in prayer during this Holy Week...

OUR PRAYER FOR YOU

For this reason I kneel before the Father, from whom every family in heaven and on earth derives its name. I pray that out of his glorious riches he may strengthen you with power through his Spirit in your inner being, so that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith. And I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, may have power, together with all the Lord's holy people, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, and to know this love that surpasses knowledge—that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God

Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever! Amen.

A call for God's people

God of peace,
We pray for worried mothers
and fathers.
We pray for frightened
children.

We pray for people who cannot flee.

And for those who are running for their lives. Bring comfort, safety and provision, O God.

We pray for those reaching out to help the vulnerable. We pray for leaders on both sides.

We pray for a world that seems darker today. Bring wisdom, calm and compassion, O God,

And let your light shine on the people of Ukraine. May there be an immediate end to the conflict, And lasting peace.

In Jesus' name we pray. Amen. The world is reeling from the unprovoked and unjust invasion of Ukraine by Russia. The people of Ukraine now face the prospect of a prolonged period of conflict and suffering.

When faced with a crisis like the conflict in Ukraine, it can be hard to know how to pray. But the desire to pray itself is a great place to start. So we wanted to offer you some ways in which you can pray into this complex and deeply disturbing conflict.

Enter this time of prayer in the confidence that Jesus has the VICTORY - no power of Hell or scheme of man can change that truth.

We know our God is a God of peace – whose heart is to bring healing and reconciliation to all conflicts everywhere. In God's kingdom there is no place for war, or for the powerful to dominate the weak. As children of His Kingdom we have power and authority to bring this healing to earth when we pray in Jesus' name.

Pray for people affected by the violence

- That people still in Ukraine
 will be protected from the
 violence; that there will be
 provision of essential
 supplies, such as food and
 clean water. Pray for
 vulnerable people who
 cannot flee, for example
 those with disabilities or the
 elderly.
- That refugees will find safe places to stay - pray that there will be compassion and support for all.
- For healing for people who are wounded or have experienced trauma; and comfort for those who are grieving.

Pray for the church

- That the church in the Ukraine, Russia and across the wider region will be a voice for peace; that they will have the resources they need to help people.
- That the church and other organisations around the world will have the courage and conviction to speak out against aggression and injustice.
- That God's power will be revealed through the church in this situation - bringing a message of love and hope in the midst of the darkness.



Stay here and keep watch with me

MATTHEW 26: 38

In Matthew 26, we follow Jesus as he eats with his disciples and friends, then walks to Gethsemane with them to pray.

Jesus desires companionship. He wants his closest friends to be with him. He creates opportunities, through shared meals and shared times of prayer, for his followers to deepen their unity.

We know that his disciples don't get it right at this moment, but after the Holy Spirit comes at Pentecost, we see them live out the unity that Jesus modelled to them.

John 21

John shares with us his account of a deeply personal, powerfully intimate and ultimately unifying moment in the lives of Jesus' closest friends, as he appears to them for the third time since his resurrection.

Take time to pray about the intersections in your life:

Between work and rest

Between family and faith

Between possessions and giving

Between Jesus and the world

What is Jesus repeating to you about these places?

What is he reassuring you about?

What is his vision for how you live your life half in the boat and half in the water, half in the world and half in the Kingdom?
